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



Just two examples

Cancer

- Rural areas have lower rates of new cancer cases, but a higher death rate
- Slower progress in reducing new cases of cancer and cancer deaths
- Colorectal and Lung Cancers preventable, but deadliest

Opioid Use


- Lack of prevention, treatment, and recovery resources
- Higher average of Rx to Opioids in rural communities; higher prevalence of chronic pain
- Earlier age of drug use and misuse

- **4,440** organization programs


















Rural Health

Between 2010-2020, 130 rural hospitals closed and 16 of those were in TN. As of March 2021, 23 counties in TN are without a hospital.

Over 145,000 of our Medicaid Population live in Rural Communities

Community-led Capacity Building

- We believe that the dollars assigned to Connected Communities should be invested in building capacity locally - offered as grants or reimbursement payments to help local partners align resources to achieve impact.
- We also know local governance structures that help drive these projects are essential, and must be led by the community, that's why we support our partners to invest resources in community-led decision-making.





Per-Referral Consent and Permission-Based Access

- Findhelp uses a "per-referral" consent model.
- We believe organizations should be able to access referrals based on care coordination responsibilities.
- Private referrals should remain private, with the Seeker having the choice to share.






Organization Choice

- Organizations should be able to send, receive, and respond to referrals in their chosen system of record.
- When organizations control their own information sharing and data, and we support organizations' ability to make these decisions, we build trust and make it easier to engage.










CBOs: The Backbone of Social Care



- Finding and accessing resources




Recognizing the Barriers to Technology and Rural Health

Rural communities have varied levels of:

- Internet/Broadband Access
- Technological Literacy ("Digital Divide")
- Workforce Shortages
- Lack of access to hospitals, primary and specialty care
- Lack of Programmatic Funding



Closing Loops Across Stakeholders



Any party involved in a referral (member, CBO, navigator) may close the loop and track outcomes.

Closed Loop: Any referral with a conclusive status indicating a final update, or the referral is "done".

This includes referrals with the following statuses: *eligible, referred elsewhere, got help.*







Sam Social Worker navigates on behalf of 55 year-old John Member



John has been living with obesity for most of his life, and decided that he wanted to make a change to help him lose weight.







Sam coaches John on using the Community Resource Link and located several organizations that offer weight loss therapy



John connects with a couple of programs, and ultimately

found one that fit his needs.

Member Journey: John

After using the CRL, John has made dramatic progress and is proceeding with medical options to help with his weight loss journey.
