

# **Workforce Program**

The workforce program, first piloted in West Tennessee and later expanded statewide, began with a simple question: How can RHA leverage their K-12 school and healthcare members to address rural workforce shortages using the DOL Apprenticeship model?

For the past two years RHA has established new relationships with high school Career and Technical Education (CTE) directors, technical and community colleges, long-term assisted living facilities, and state-level Department of Labor (DOL) entities through a grant-funded pilot aimed at introducing youth to careers in healthcare.

RHA collaborates with K-12 schools, community and technical colleges, and employers to support more than 200 individuals achieve careers in healthcare.



### ··· Coordinated School Health Impact

For 23 years, RHA and Coordinated School Health have been working together to improve health outcomes for students.

Twelve new resources were developed between August and December 2022.
